# Living Beyond Breast Cancer



Living Beyond Breast Cancer is a nonprofit organization that helps people diagnosed with breast cancer understand their options, make informed decisions, and connect to people who have been where they are.

We believe that finding ways to support emotional and mental health is just as important as getting the right cancer treatment.

- Our peer-to-peer **Breast Cancer Helpline** answers calls from people during their hardest days. Each year, we help over 750 people with emotional support, guidance, and hope.
- Our **blog** has been named one of the Best Breast Cancer Blogs by Healthline. It's home to personal stories of people impacted by breast cancer, including the voices of those often underrepresented such as people living with metastatic disease, young women, and Black women.
- In 2025 we distributed over 310 **grants** totaling \$340,000 to individuals in treatment so they can focus on their health instead of their bills.



# Getting started

With DIY (do-it-yourself) fundraising you can turn any activity, hobby, or event into a way to support Living Beyond Breast Cancer and those navigating a breast cancer diagnosis. The first step is simple – brainstorm ideas that genuinely excite you! Whether it is selling baked goods or organizing a pickleball event, let your personal interests guide your DIY fundraiser.

## On your own

Turn your passion into purpose. Climb a mountain, host a bake sale, challenge yourself - do anything you love as a fundraiser. Our JustGiving fundraising pages make this easy!

## At work or school

Host a dress down or spice it up day, challenge friends, teachers, or colleagues in a contest, host a raffle, potluck, or lunchtime yoga class.

## Host an event

From a car show to a softball tournament or a craft fair with your faith community, proceeds from events are a great way to raise awareness and funds for breast cancer.



Many companies offer to match the money employees have raised. Speak to your HR department to see if this is something your company offers.

## On social media

Turn your special day – finishing treatment, birthday, anniversary, or any occasion into a fundraiser on social media.

## In honor or memorial

Create a fundraiser in memory of a loved one or in honor of a friend or family member to show your support.

# Set-up your online fundraising page

The easiest way to fundraise and promote your fundraiser is by setting up a JustGiving page. Follow these steps and link your fundraiser to Living Beyond Breast Cancer.

## Tell your story

Customize your page with your personal story, photos, and updates. Think about why you're raising money for Living Beyond Breast Cancer and why the cause is important to you. What matters to you, matters to your friends and family.

## Set a goal

Setting a goal gives your supporters something to get behind, so don't be afraid to go big. And if you reach your goal, you can increase your amount.

## Inspire action

Show your personal commitment to the cause and be the first to make a donation. This will likely inspire others to get involved.

## Reach out

Email your friends, family, and colleagues with the link to your page, and share it on social media. Share posts to your stories and get your friends to interact with your posts. Include examples of how fundraising makes an impact. See our promotional tips on the next page.

## Share

Your JustGiving page comes with a [personalized QR code](#). Add the QR code to our editable posters. Then print and display them around your community. People can then scan the code and donate directly to your page.

## Update and follow-up

Update your page with progress and resend to your contacts who haven't responded. We receive many messages each day; it's hard to keep track of what's important. Follow-up with anyone who hasn't responded. Chances are they intended on getting around to it!

## Gratitude

Thanking your donors is the most important part of fundraising. Make sure that your donors know how much you appreciate their support! Send personalized emails, hand-written notes, or tag them on social media. After the event, update your page with photos and the result, and remind people they can still donate.

# Promote your fundraiser

People can't support you and your fundraiser if you don't ask. We've rounded up some of our top tips to help you spread the word.



Email your friends, family, and co-workers. Be sure to include a link to your JustGiving page and how they can get involved.



Create your own posters to promote your event. Download our poster templates and personalize them for your event. Ask to display them at your library, shops, and local businesses, etc.



Reach out to local newspapers, radio stations and community websites in your area to share your story. If you're hosting an event, ask to list it on their calendar of events.



Make a presentation at work, school, or to your community or faith group.

## Top tips for SOCIAL MEDIA



Write a post, record a video, or go LIVE to talk about your fundraiser.

- Download and share our social media graphics or use your own.
- Be sure to include a link to your online fundraising page on your profiles or posts.
- A picture says a thousand words – always add pictures to your posts, it can be of you, photos about your fundraiser, or someone you're fundraising in honor of.
- Tag @LivingBeyondBC – we love to see what you're doing and cheer you on!
- Use popular hashtags like #breastcancer and #livebeyondbc to get more attention.
- Create a fundraiser on Facebook or Instagram

## **Is JustGiving the only website that can be used for my fundraiser?**

## **What are the guidelines for fundraisers that include door prizes, raffles drawings and/or sweepstakes?**

Federal and state laws prohibit and/or restrict certain gaming activities such as door prizes, raffles, drawings, etc. These laws vary from state to state. Please be advised that Living Beyond Breast Cancer cannot provide legal or tax advice to individual fundraisers.

## **How should checks be made out?**

## **Is my donation tax-deductible?**

Contributions to Living Beyond Breast Cancer may be fully tax deductible permissible by law.

## **Will I receive a tax receipt for my donation?**

Living Beyond Breast Cancer issues physical tax receipts for donations received by check through the mail. If you make an online donation using a credit or debit card, you'll receive an immediate acknowledgement. If your donation is in cash form, you will not receive a tax receipt.

10% of all breast cancer cases happen in women 45 years old and younger.



Black women are 38% more likely to die from breast cancer than white women.

**Did you know?**

## RISK FACTORS

Your risk for breast cancer is due to a combination of factors. Having a risk factor does not mean you will get the disease, and not all risk factors have the same effect. Talk with your doctor about how to assess your risk.



Those who are not physically active have a higher risk of getting breast cancer.



The risk for breast cancer increases with age. Most breast cancers are diagnosed after age 50.



Those who have inherited mutations to certain genes, such as BRCA1 and BRCA2, are at higher risk.

Women with dense breasts are more likely to get breast cancer.

## Breast cancer facts

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women in the United States, except for skin cancers.

About 1 in 8 U.S. women will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lives.

Anyone with breast tissue can get breast cancer, even men.

Approximately 15% of women who get breast cancer have a family member diagnosed with it.

In 2025, an estimated 170,000 people in the U.S. live with metastatic, or stage IV, breast cancer. Metastatic breast cancer is breast cancer that has spread to other parts of the body.

For the last 30 years, the mortality rate for breast cancer has been declining. But at the same time, the rate of people diagnosed with breast cancer has been rising.

In 2025, an estimated 42,680 people in the U.S. will die from metastatic breast cancer.

Black women are 38% more likely to die from breast cancer than white women, despite lower incidence of disease.

10% of all breast cancer cases happen in women 45 years old and younger.

Breast cancers in women under 45 are more likely to be diagnosed at a later stage than older women.

Young women tend to have dense breasts. Mammograms are less likely to find tumors in women with dense breasts.
